

NEW CBE Framework for Learning and Working with Indigenous Cultural Supports

In January 2024, the CBE introduced a new process to support schools and service units when learning and working with Indigenous Cultural Supports (Elders, Knowledge Keepers, drummers etc.) who receive an honorarium. To support our collective work, the Indigenous Education and Finance teams have designed a one-hour professional learning session open to all CBE staff. This session is intended to ensure that all schools and service units have up-to-date information on the processes and protocol for learning and working with Indigenous Cultural Supports, including:

- Welcoming of Indigenous Cultural Supports
- New CBE Honorarium Form and rates.
- Information about the new Indigenous

 Circle of Indigenous Cultural Supports.



Sessions will continue to be offered weekly in the month of February, and monthly from March to June, with all dates/times listed on the Indigenous Cultural Supports Insite page and in EAMs. We encourage all CBE staff to sign up for a session, as strengthening CBE's relationships with Indigenous Cultural Supports is important for the well-being and academic success of Indigenous students, as well as for upholding Truth and Reconciliation through education for all students.

Celebrate Spring Equinox on March 20

March 20th marks the Spring Equinox. In 2023, Elder Saa'kokoto shared Blackfoot teachings about the significance of this day. To acknowledge this important day, teachers are encouraged to share the video with their classes and to take their students outside to reflect on and appreciate the beauty and significance of this day. 

Celebrating Indigenous Education Initiatives in the CBE



Niihiyiyat Celebrations

As part of the *Niihiyiyat (nee-hee-yee-yah)* locally developed course, students at Terry Fox School learned about sky stories through Wilfred Buck's Rattle Story, *Sisikwun*. Water melts from the bottom up, creating ice crystals. Wind makes the sound of a rattle as it blows across the ice, calling the animals, plants, people to "wanska!" (wake up!) in *sikwun*—Spring. Students were then taught how to make rattles in response to the story. They learned how to harvest materials properly, to create their own rattles, and to decorate them

with personalized symbols that reflect their identity. Through this hands-on, experiential learning, students will remember the story whenever they shake their rattles.

Students in the *Niihiyiyat* course at Dr. G.M. Egbert, Ian Bazalgette and Ernest Morrow schools were supported by the AFCC's *Honouring Life* program and Elder's teachings as they learned how to make medicine bags and Métis dot paint. The activities included regular check-ins through sharing circles for holistic well-being and community building. The students look forward to this learning continuing through the next season!
